Romans 12 1-3

I exhort you, therefore, brothers, in view of Godâ€[™]s mercies, to offer yourselves as a sacrifice, living and set apart for God. This will please him; it is the logical "Temple worship― for you. In other words, do not let yourselves be conformed to the standards of the â€~olam hazeh (present age). Instead, keep letting yourselves be transformed by the renewing of your minds; so that you will know what God wants and will agree that what he wants is good, satisfying and able to succeed. For I am telling every single one of you, through the grace that has been given to me, not to have exaggerated ideas about your own importance. Instead, develop a sober estimate of yourself based on the standard which God has given to each of you, namely, trust.

Devotional

God\'s mercies are referenced throughout chapters 1 - 11, especially in 9 - 11 and explicitly in 11:30-32. This section is the pivotal point of the book of Romans, on which Sha\'ul (Paul) turns from doctrine to the practical advice; \"I exhort you, therefore, brothers, in view of God\'s mercies, to offer yourselves as a sacrifice, living and set apart for God.\" This is a striking metaphor, in that animal sacrifices were still being made twice daily within Temple worship in Jerusalem. The warning to Gentiles against boasting and conceit (11:18, 25) is extended to \"every single one of You,\" because a person committed to doing God\'s will is easy prey to delusions of grandeur.
